



% of Free/Reduced Lunch Students on Long Island









% of ELL Students on Long Island













Among all 13- to 17-year-olds, percent who check social media:




Teen Social Media and Phone Use Over Time


Teens preferred method of communication



Statistically significant drug overdose death rate increase from 2016 to 2017, US States




The Drug Overdose Mortality Increase New York State












Percentage of Students in Long Island's Least Wealthy and Wealthiest School Districts Passing the Regents Exams in 2017-18




School Funding aka Show Me The Money

Distribution of Aid vs. Percentage of Students






