



% of Free/Reduced Lunch Students on Long Island









% of English Language Learners on Long Island
















The Drug-Related Death Toll New York State






Suffolk ELL ELA (3-8) 2013 - 2017











Tax Cap Since Inception


A 2% Tax Cap Allowable Levy Growth Factor for School District Property Tax



School Funding Foundation Aid

If the Foundation Aid formula had been fully funded for 2017-18:

- Long Island schools would have received an additional \$5.9 billion in Foundation Aid over the past 11 years.
- Our lowest-wealth districts, who educate over 45% of Long Island's students, would have received an additional \$4.4 billion.

School Funding Foundation Aid

- In 2017-18 the amount of Foundation Aid owed per pupil was over 8 times greater in low-wealth districts than in high-wealth districts.
- Long Island's low-wealth districts received 30% less Foundation Aid than if they had been fully funded.
 Statewide, the reduction was only 16%. Our poorest districts would have received an additional \$275 million had they received the same reduction as the rest of the state.






