- If Long Island was a state, it would rank #1 in the percentage (14.2%) of public high schools identified as "America's Top" by Newsweek.

Long Island's Foundation Aid in 2017-18 as a percent of total Long Island Aid is 4.5% lower than that of the state as a whole.

# School Funding Foundation Aid



If the Foundation Aid formula had been fully funded by 2016-17:

- Long Island schools would have received an additional \$5.2 billion in Foundation Aid over the past 10 years.
- Our lowest-wealth districts, who educate nearly onehalf of Long Island's students, would have received an additional \$3.8 billion.

# School Funding Foundation Aid



- The amount of Foundation Aid owed per pupil is over 7.5 times greater in low-wealth districts than in high-wealth districts.
- In 2016-17, Long Island's low-wealth districts received 30% less Foundation Aid than if they had been fully funded. Statewide, the reduction was only 18%. Our poorest districts would have received an additional \$227 million had they received the same reduction as the rest of the state.
