


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New Report

The Academy Opens Student-run Physical Therapy Clinic

A new student-operated physical therapy clinic now serves the Long Island community by providing inexpensive rehabilitation to patients who don't have insurance or whose insurance has run out. This venture also gives

the Academy's Physical Therapy Aide students the opportunity to gain

valuable industry experience.

Licensed Physical Therapist and Physical Therapy Aide Teacher Jennifer Nicodemo-Capra treats all patients while her students provide support as aides. They create written home exercise programs and supervise established programs, size crutches, prepare treatment and exercise areas, and more.

The Academy Physical Therapy Outpatient Clinic is housed inside the Physical Therapy Aide classroom at Bixhorn Tech Center on the ESBOCES Bellport campus at 350 Martha Avenue. All services are \$5. The clinic does not accept insurance and all payments must be in cash.

Half of all proceeds are donated to Matthew's Giving Tree Foundation, a nonprofit corporation that assists the families of special-needs students with the financial support to purchase adaptive equipment or meet their medical requirements.

"We've spread the word about the clinic through two Bellport-based churches and among the students and staff," said Capra. "My students will also earn service hours, work with real patients in an actual clinic, and do everything that their job title requires. They can put this experience on their resumes and college applications."

The Eastern Long Island Academy of Applied Technology, referred to as the Academy, is the Career and Technical Education Program of Eastern Suffolk BOCES. The Academy creates opportunities for students by providing them with the technical and academic skills needed to prepare for future employment and a successful path to college or other post-secondary programs. Locations are based in Bellport, Oakdale, and Riverhead.

ESBOCES, Hofstra Collaborate on DEI Certification Program

A new joint effort between ESBOCES and Hofstra University has produced a DEI and Educational Leadership Certificate program for educators, administrators, and staff. The New York State Board of Regents has called on all schools to develop policies to advance DEI (Diversity, Equity, and Inclusivity) in their districts to foster higher degrees of engagement and acceptance among all groups of students and school personnel, regardless of gender, disabilities, sexual identity, and culture.

The seven-session, live Zoom program coaches attendees on how to create sustainable solutions around diversity, equity, and inclusivity within their school communities, and to develop a network of equity leaders to advance that work. Among other activities, participants will study DEI terms and theory, review sample rubrics, plans, and case studies, and create an equity action plan for implementation.

Increase in Non-traditional CTE Enrollment at the Academy

Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses have not only seen overall increased enrollment this school year, there are also now more students enrolled in non-traditional programs than ever before. Non-traditional CTE programs are identified as those connected to occupations or fields of work comprised of less than 25 percent of one gender. Examples include women in automotive, electronics, or welding careers, or men in education, nursing, or cosmetology careers. Female enrollment in non-traditional trade programs is at a new high at all Academy locations.

Ward Tech Center in Riverhead currently has its first female in the Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning (HVAC) Program, a female student in their brand new Trade Electric Program, and multiple female students in Automotive Technology and Auto Body Repair and Car Customizing classes. HVAC Instructor Christopher Gibat attributes the growing interest in these trades to the women already in the field. "I think that we are starting to see this trend in the classrooms because students are seeing females already working in these trades and paving the way," he said.

"In the past, we would see one female student in one of these programs, but now we are seeing females in all of them," said Robert Van Brunt, program administrator for Career and Technical Education.

At Bixhorn Tech Center, female students are enrolled in the traditionally maledominated programs of Carpentry, Marine/Motorsports Technology, Plumbing and Heating, Trade Electric, Aviation, Computer Tech and Repair, and Barbering, while Milliken Tech Center has a female Welding student, as well as several

female students taking advantage of the Automotive programs.

Many of these non-traditional students are coming into these programs with background knowledge of the work they are being trained to

do. The Trade Electric Program at Bixhorn Tech Center seemed like a natural fit for Jamie Lyn Davi, **Rocky Point UFSD**, who grew up helping her electrician father on his job sites. Several of the young women in the Automotive classes grew up working on cars with family, like Sydney Palmer, **Center Moriches UFSD**, who says her Ward Tech Center Auto Body Repair and Car Customizing class is just like a family.

Female students at the Academy have also chosen their CTE programs based on long-range career ambitions. Joylyn Jun, **Patchogue-Medford UFSD**, is an aspiring architect completing the Plumbing and Heating course at Bixhorn Tech Center. "This program will give me a better background when I will apply to college," she said. Sarah Alessi, **Shoreham-Wading River CSD**, enrolled in the Trade Electric Program at Ward Tech Center because she aspires to become an electrical engineer and will enter college with useful certifications.

"I was a little worried there wouldn't be other girls in the program, but when I showed up the first day, I was comfortable," Sarah said. "Being lefthanded in this program is a bigger challenge than being a girl."

The Academy has also seen an uptick in male students enrolling in traditionally female-dominated programs. Milliken Tech Center has several male students in its Cosmetology, Nurse Assisting, and Early Childhood Education programs. An increased number of males are enrolled in Dental Assisting, Fashion Merchandising and Design, and Practical Nursing programs at Bixhorn Tech Center.
